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




Urban wastelands: a form of urban nature?

### Introduction

- The petite ceinture, a railway that circles Paris, built in the middle of the 19th century, for passenger and freight transport
- 20th century : competition of the metro and desindustrialisation...
- 1990's: the end of train circulation (except a segment in the west)

























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### Introduction

Around 20 kilometers of railway unexploited

Colonized by flora, fauna... and many inhabitants, despite a prohibited access

























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
### Introduction

Around 20 kilometers of railway unexploited

Colonized by flora, fauna... and many inhabitants, despite a prohibited access

2000's : from a railway to a green infrastructure

- An ecological management since 2006
- A territorial stake for the biodiversity policy of Paris (2011)
- Creation of associative gardens and public green spaces by the City of Paris























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### Introduction

While the petite ceinture is in transition to a space of nature,

Do (material and immaterial) relations of informal users with the place rely on nature and how is this nature thought out?

Research based on an ethnological survey (2013-2014)

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### I. The place meaning: an « elsewhere »

*Informal users profiles* 

Mostly men, but a significant presence of women

Mostly teenagers (12-20 years) Adults from 20 to 40 years old Occasionnally a few accompanied children and adults over 50 years old

Middle classes dominant Working classes differently represented People in precarious situations

A selection based on different dispositions to transgress and physical capacities

























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### I. The place meaning: an « elsewhere »

The *petite ceinture* is above all an « elsewhere »...

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« en dehors de Paris » (outside of Paris)
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« un échappatoire par rapport à tout le reste » (an escape from everything else)

« comme si c'était une bulle à part » (as if it was a bubble apart)

« sortir de Paris sans quitter Paris » (getting out of Paris without leaving Paris)

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### I. The place meaning: an « elsewhere »

The petite ceinture is above all an « elsewhere »...

... because it's physically separated from the rest of the city :

The fences: a concrete frontier between the inside and the outside

A space often invisible from public spaces around





















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### I. The place meaning: an « elsewhere »

The petite ceinture is above all an « elsewhere »...

... because it's governed by different rules than public spaces

A peculiar sociability
A reduced surveillance (explicitly felt and wished)

From conventional practices...

Alternative tourism, walks, convivial meetings...

To transgression...

Break-in, graffiti, cannabis smoking, campfire, stones throwing...

**Body** expression

Entering, striding along... in a space not designed for walking and pedestrians

And other forms of body expression as shooting, singing, dancing, jumping, throwing...

Material creativity

Through manipulation, construction, destruction...





























### II. Informal activities: recreation, transgression, creativity and sheltering

But also sheltering

Mostly men
French or from Eastern Europ mainly
Poor, sometimes workers

Alone or in groups, they lived in the railway for court periods or several years

























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# III. The wasteland nature, a component of the place identity

What place for nature?

#### Nature isn't fundamental in the relations with the place

Practices linked to nature (gardening, naturalist observations...) marginal and limited interactions

In discourses, nature isn't what users look for in the first place

However, nature (particularly vegetation) is a component of the place's identity























# III. The wasteland nature, a component of the place identity

From an ecological point of view

Species diversity is sometimes known by medias or presumed through observation

However : ecological discourses are marginal

























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# III. The wasteland nature, a component of the place identity

A socio-spatial meaning

« wild », « rare in the city », « less controlled », « less ordered »...

The spontaneous vegetation is the nature of the elsewhere, **linked to order and control issues** 

Always valued and compared to vegetation in the city and parks, still mostly selectioned and managed

























# III. The wasteland nature, a component of the place identity

A socio-spatial meaning

- > A nature thought in relation to the place signification
- Reflect of the (relative) freedom that people experiment here
- Defended on the name of a right to exist in the city





















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### Conclusion

As urban green spaces offer nooks, the *petite ceinture* is a great **hiding place** 

- ➤ That offers a particular intimacy (less dense, less watched), where people can get closer or be isolated
- It offers a peculiar experience in the city, where there's a place for the unexpected
- > It welcomes other social practices, depreciated or that can't exist elsewhere

The petite ceinture is a « social breathing zone »
